October 17, 2009

Meeting called to order by President Jill Floberg at 9:45 AM at the home of Meg Naylor-Baine

Roll Call: in attendance were, Jill Floberg, Nancy Shock, Russ Kittle, Norm Lazarus, Meg Naylor Elodji Means, and Jan Schefcik

Motion by Meg Naylor to approve minutes from last board meeting on August 1, 2009 as published, Russ seconds, all in favor. The board thanks Jan for taking minutes at the last meeting.

Presidents Report: Jill called a board meeting to approve sending \$250 in support of the 2009 National Specialty, this was approved by majority vote.

PLEASE, Bring That Toy Back!

This was posted on the Clean Run group – it's a great way to get your dog to bring the toy back instead of playing "Keep Away."

Keep-away only "works" for the dog *if you're willing* to play it with him.

To fix this problem, I recommend "magazine training". To do this, you'll need a chair and the latest copy of Clean Run magazine.

- Sit in the chair.
- Throw the toy.
- Start reading the magazine, holding it with one hand. Keep the other hand open, palm-up, passively resting on your leg, ready to receive the toy but NOT reaching for it.
- Enjoy the article you're reading and ignore your dog as he teases you to get you to buy into his keep-away game.
- Keep away is a very boring game when played solitaire, so your dog will probably try all his best tease-y moves to get you to play.
- Do NOT cast disapproving looks at him. Do NOT ask or tell him to bring it to you.
- And Do NOT reach for the toy if he brings it close.
- Occasionally smile blandly at your dog and then glance at your own open hand, then go back to reading Clean Run.

Eventually the dog will get bored with trying to get you to play keep away. And because it's difficult for most dogs to throw a toy far enough themselves to make it fun to run and get it, he will start wanting you to throw the toy for him again.

At this point, most dogs will approach the boring, seated, magazine-reading person and either drop the toy at the person's feet, drop the toy on the open magazine to disrupt the reading and get the person's attention back on the toy-game, or brush the toy against the open hand and then drop it on the ground.

If the dog does any of those things, look up from your reading and receive the toy. If the dog tries to grab the toy before you can reach it, shrug and go back to reading (keeping one palm open and upward, resting on your leg.)

Most dogs figure out pretty quickly, within five minutes, that the only way to get you to throw the toy again (or play a round of tug and then throw it for him) is to let you *have* it. He'll try keep-away a few more times with subsequent throws, to see if you'll revert to your old behavior, but if you just ignore his keep-away

teasing and enjoy the magazine, he'll realize you are just going to continue to be BORING *until* he GIVES you the toy.

The occasional dog will take up to a half-hour, to figure out this new "twist" (no more keep-away) in your "usual" pattern of playing fetch (and/or tug-fetch) with him. If your dog does take that long, no biggie... just enjoy reading Clean Run until he figures out YOUR new rules for the fetch game.

You may need to do magazine training for a week or so before your dog realizes you are no longer interested in playing keep-away with him. Once he catches on to this fact, you can start holding out for an *intentional* placement (and release) of the throw-toy in your hand. Just read until he does it.

He'll eventually do it. And in the process you'll get to enjoy some good reading. :)

Beardie Works Editor Comment:

The critical line in this article starts "Eventually the dog will get bored with trying..." Sorry, no Beardie gets bored. They just invent new games.

I've tried this method and suggest moderating it with a Beardie. When I ignore my dog she just keeps bringing me things, scours the back yard for more balls and toys until there is a pile of supplies just outside of my arms reach.

I suggest you award even the implication of positive behavior (as Jennifer pointed out at the Winter Party) and work your way to a ball at your feet, or in your hand.

Pumpkin Rocks with Cream-Cheese Frosting

Reprinted with permission from The All-American Cookie Book, by Nancy Baggett (Houghton Mifflin Co., 2001).

For the cookies:

1 cup (5 ounces) raisins
3 cups all-purpose white flour
1-1/2 teaspoons ground cinnamon
1 teaspoon baking soda
3/4 teaspoon ground cloves
3/4 teaspoon ground nutmeg
Scant 1/2 teaspoon salt
1-1/3 cups sugar
2/3 cup (1 stick plus 2-2/3 tablespoons) unsalted butter, slightly softened
1/2 cup corn oil or other flavorless vegetable oil
1/4 cup light molasses
1-1/2 teaspoons vanilla extract
1 cup canned pumpkin (not seasoned pumpkin-pie filling)

For the cream-cheese frosting:

2-1/2 cups powdered sugar
1 3-ounce package cream cheese, slightly softened and cut into chunks
1/4 teaspoon vanilla extract
1 tablespoon orange juice

Preheat the oven to 350 degrees. Grease several baking sheets or coat with nonstick spray.

In a small bowl, cover the raisins with hot water. Let stand for 10 minutes. Drain well and set aside.

In a medium bowl, thoroughly stir together the flour, cinnamon, baking soda, cloves, nutmeg and salt; set aside. In a large bowl, with an electric mixer on medium speed, beat together the sugar and butter until very well-blended and fluffy. Reduce the speed to low and beat in the oil, molasses, vanilla and pumpkin until evenly incorporated. Beat or stir in the flour mixture, then the raisins, until evenly incorporated.

Drop the dough onto the baking sheets in golf-ball-sized mounds, spacing about 2 inches apart. Bake the cookies, one sheet at a time, in the upper third of the



oven for 12 to 15 minutes, until lightly browned all over and slightly darker at the edges. Reverse the sheet from front to back halfway through baking to ensure even browning. Transfer the sheet to a wire rack and let stand until the cookies firm up slightly, 1 to 2 minutes. Using a spatula, transfer the cookies to wire racks. Let stand until completely cooled.

For the frosting:

In a large bowl, with an electric mixer on low -- then medium -- speed, beat together the powdered sugar, cream cheese, and vanilla until well blended and very smooth. Add the orange juice and beat until evenly incorporated. If the frosting is very stiff, add enough water to thin it to a spreadable but still firm consistency.

Set the wire racks with the cookies over wax paper to catch drips. Using a table knife, swirl about 1 teaspoon frosting over the center of each cookie top. Let stand until the frosting completely sets, at least 1 hour.

Store in a single layer or layered with wax paper in an airtight container for up to 1 week, or freeze for up to 1 month. Makes 30 to 35 2-3/4 inch cookies

A Beardie Minute
