I am lamenting over our 15 year old Beardie. She's a bright eyed lady with a sway back who tires easily. But she is always under our feet, always ready for a walk and even tries to hop into the car whenever there is a possibility of a ride if even around the block. Our walks are shorter and slower but she always is ready, eager, tail wagging as we head out. It's the coming back that is slower. Our walks are getting shorter. Our loops through the neighborhood used to be quick paced mile but now we just can't walk slow enough to spend the time. She is willing to go the distance but she takes it at her own pace, slow and slower. Now our loops are a slow head out, duty completed and she turns around to come home. Smells seem to take on the importance of the once s-q-u-i-r-l on the fence.

There is a difference in how we relate to her with more touching, more grooming (which she loves), and special care with almost everything in her life. She is at the door when we come home, at our feet during evening dinner, at the base of the couch with an evening movie, at the foot of the bed all night and in our face during our morning routine. Sometimes it is hard to tie your shoes without catching her hair in the shoe laces; she is that close and involved. Floor exercises and stretching are almost impossible without corralling her in another room so you can have the floor space to run through your morning routine.

Yes, she is old but she is wonderfully elegant, tolerant of us, eager to be part of the family and willing to step up when asked. She still knows her obedience sits and come-arounds, and goodness how she loves her food. We wouldn't have it any other way. Older dogs are something special to have as a part of your life.

I know there's always excitement about puppies, especially Beardie puppies. But a mature dog, one who knows you and him/herself is my preference. Don't get me wrong, puppies are wonderful and it is always great to see how the puppy grows into the vision you could see when she was playing with her littermates. By the time she is 2 or 3 there is a change, a maturation, where the puppy becomes a companion and from that time on a part of your life. Some puppies mature sooner, some never mature, but that change happens with most of them as surely as black coat changes to gray (and maybe back to black), toe nails grow, and your dog needs grooming.

Friends with larger dogs marvel when I share my dog experiences. "Your dog is 15, goodness my breed never makes it past 10! Oh how nice it would be to have those extra 5 or 10 years." And in truth we all want another year or 5 or 10 or 20 or more. The truth about our companions is that we outlive them and have to experience the whole life cycle over and over again. From puppy to hospice, from spots on the rug to... well, spots on the rug. And for us who are addicted to this relationship we have to experience it over and over again, knowing what to expect and accepting the outcome. Maybe that's the glory of this love affair with our dogs. We care for them and they teach us about life.

A friend's father lost his life companion, a Golden, who was as much a part of the family as his daughter or his son. I'm told he is afraid to look at puppies for fear he will forget his companion. Another dog in his life would lessen the importance of his trusted buddy. Time will tell, but I'll bet that someday soon he will be looking, maybe with a stroll through the shelter or a call to the breed rescue. Life without a dog at your side is truly only half a life.

So I fear the loss in our future and learn to enjoy each day with our girl. The old adage that every day is a gift is certainly true. I may lament the advancing years but when she comes up to me, those big eyes asking to go for a short slow walk, I will certainly grab a leash and grant her that wish. Each day, each walk, is a gift and an honor to share with an elegant lady. <

### 9:00 am – 1:00 pm

#### Indian Hills [10 minutes west of C-470 off Highway 285]

For our 2nd Annual Beardie Agility Day, we are fortunate to be returning to Diane DuBose's training facility in Indian Hills. Experienced dogs **AND** novices are invited, since we are planning runs and exercises for all levels of agility knowledge. Even if agility is not your performance sport, RMBCC members and their dogs are welcome and encouraged to attend just for the fun and camaraderie. The tentative schedule for the morning is below:

- Coffee and morning snacks
- Warm up exercises using obedience and rally commands
- For novice dogs and handlers, Diane will discuss how to get started and what it takes for success. Everyone will be able to try out the equipment including jumps, tunnels, A-frame, dog walk, etc.
- Experienced dogs who are already trialing will run several courses
- And to finish, a RELAY RACE for everyone participating it was the HIT of last year's event! Dividing into teams with novice, intermediate and advanced dogs, we go to our marks and wait for the baton.....
- Lunch will end the day

**<u>Cost:</u>** \$25 for the first dog and \$15/dog for the second or more. Please bring cash or a check made out to "Diane DuBose." If you are just coming to watch or cheer on the participants, there will be no charge.

You will need a crate, water for your dog, poop bags and a chair.

**Directions:** 10 minutes west of C470 off Highway 285 (Hampden Avenue). Head west into the foothills, exit at Indian Hills on Parmalee Gulch Road. From that exit, it is exactly 3.1 miles to Diane's house. Pass the fire station and elementary school on the right and two churches on the left. Parmalee Gulch will take a hard left curve. DO NOT TAKE THAT CURVE. Go straight onto the dirt road, which is Supai Road. There is a street sign on your left. Within 20 feet take a left into the first driveway – address is marked on a big piece of flagstone – La Boheme, 23782 Supai Road. Go up the driveway and park in the grass next to the agility field.
