It is down right scary when he does this. After a short time, he quits and he is fine again. Is there anything I can do for him? Is it dangerous? He is not a smoker, and no one in our house smokes either. Should I be worried, or will he get over it? We have had the same people since we were just pups together.

Dear Buddy's Girl,

I cannot be sure, but your description sure sounds like the condition often called "reverse sneezing". The medical term describes it as a "pharyngeal spasm". Folks say it sounds like the dog is inhaling sneezes. My vet says the dog typically appears normal before and after the episode. She said it can be caused by various irritants like household chemicals, cleaners, perfumes, or even viruses. Although it is typically not dangerous, she said you should make sure your people take Buddy to the vet to find out if there is a cause that needs treatment.

I got to tell you, that I just love to bark! I bark at stuff outside. I bark when I want to go outside and I bark when I want to come inside again. I bark when my people come home each day. I bark at other dogs when my people walk me. I just love to bark, but my people say it might disturb the neighbors. They want me to stop barking, but I don't know how to stop. Can you help?

Dear Bar.

Well, dear I sure can sympathize with your love of barking. Many Beardies share your enthusiasm for barking. Some Beardies love to show their enthusiasm for life by barking. It is a genetic trait we use for herding and other times when we must alert others. There is no twelve-step bark-o-holic program that I know of. But there are some things your people can try. This one worked with my dear little Fluffy. They might have you sit or down immediately when they come home so that your thoughts are on a task rather than barking, while they greet, and pet you. Then, when you obeyed the sit or down command, your peeps have something to praise you for instead of barking back at you to be quiet. Maybe it would work if you taught your peeps to shake hands or "give 5" at those times when you feel like barking. This will occupy your thoughts on something other than barking. Maybe you could show your excitement by bringing them your favorite toy. Some folks use a bark collar; a devise that helps "remind" you not to bark. Aunt Beardie is not a big fan of those collars, and most dogs quickly learn that they can bark when the collar is off. They have not learned to react in a different, positive way. But the collar is an option if things get critical. If your peeps can help you show your Beardie enthusiasm in quiet ways, you may forget about the need to bark. Yours Truly,

Dinner amounts in Planning Guide: Nan says they need to be changed slightly. Working with Jill. We'll probably need to honor any registrations/payments we get in before it's changed.

Discussion regarding finances: Nancy put together an example of the breakdown in BCCA vs. RMBCC money. The example compared 2004 to 2010 for easier understanding. Also attached was a copy of the contract.

Everyone is encouraged to review the Planning Guide on line. Of importance; communicating "½ of the hotel bill will be charged for cancellation after Aug 20th".

Ribbons – This still needs to be completed. We need someone knowledgeable on Nationals to coordinate and talk to all committees/Candy/ BaRay.

Web needs "Site seeing & Tours". Mike Tupa would be good at this.

Bathing stations & shampoos/conditioners: Espana reps Stacy Collins & business partner Michelle have spoken to Jill and volunteered shampoo and conditioner for our bathing stations, as well as samples for our cooler "give away" item. Several of us have used these products and really like them. Jill has a bunch of Coat Handler shampoo/conditioner left over to use. Decision was made to offer both at the bathing station – they are not competing with each other. Espana may want to add a flyer/coupon in with their sample.

Cooler sample shown by Laura – blue with zipper & side water pocket. Will have black "2010 Through the Years" printed on it. Costs; \$3.85 + 50 cents shipping each. \$45 one-time set-up fee. Probably will order 350 or so; will place one order after master registrations come in. Will have Espana sample, clicker, gecko dog toy, human treat, maybe Celestial Seasoning & other stuff as Laura gets it. Maybe Budweiser beer bottle/can. Dog food samples will

be offered separately. Folder will have tickets (Nan doing), name badge, info like maps and weekly events schedule. Folder and cooler will be given at same time (2 per family limit on cooler) at registration table. Registration table/booth at ES Hotel on Sun, Mon, Tues and The Ranch Wed, Thurs, Friday.

Jill had samples of the raffle items and she has the "colored tickets" organized. \$5 each or 5 for \$20. Jill's planning on sending some tickets out to Regional clubs. She had the sculptures of the black and brown beardies. Brown beardie will be donated to auction. Beige tickets – 4 different items, BCCA/RMBCC. Deadline Sept 1 and drawing Sept 2. Blue tickets – RMBCC raffle for black beardie sculpture. Drawing at Awards Dinner Red tickets – RMBCC raffle for stained glass that Jill's sister is working on.

RMBCC raffle winners will be announced at the Awards Ceremony.

Note: We owe Jill's daughter and sister for all of the work that they have done for us with their artistic contributions.

Jill showed the certificates that will be given to those that have donated at certain levels (14er's, Crufts, etc). \$3200 in Sponsorships received thus far. National Capital, N. CA, FL, Great Lakes club donations and several generous individual sponsorships. Wine bottles for regional auction sent to MI to promote sales.

Rescue/Therapy Parade & Ads -

Rescue never had to pay for ads in the past; this was supplemented by Parade of Titleholders. Both Rescue and Therapy do not have to pay for ads this year. Approx costs are ribbons \$5 each, \$15 per page ad, \$5 gift (\$25 total each). Catalog profits should help pay for costs. Forms/jpg's go to Laura by July 1st.

Nan showed us the centerpiece for Awards table; \$25 each. Jewelry box with tile/beardie. Individual "gifts" at table are silver bookmark with ribbon/paw/dog saying. A couple dollars each.

Auction -

Meals priced at \$25 to promote participation. Jill thinks the auctioneer is not charging. Silent auction will run at 1 hour intervals during regular auction. Elodji/committee will determine if items are right for

regular auction or silent.

Art contest – All digital. Gretchen has info on website with clever categories.

Logowear -

Meg showed the blanket for sale; will bring to the picnic. Michele ok'ed the embroidery picture for website, so Meg will ask Karen to put it on Logowear page. Will ask Maryann to announce logowear on BDL a couple more times before Aug 15th deadline. Meg will also contact Michele for a Beardie Works ad for logowear. Jill said that we might want some logowear for sale at the herding trial; has been successful in the past. General/Ranch set-up on Monday.

Agility – Jill reported that Helen says one ring is sufficient. Included competition is Standard, Jumpers, Fast, and the relay race. Helen has arranged the equipment and just has the electronic timers left to rent. Jill will ask if Helen would be able to come to one of our meetings for a report.

Premium lists – Kathy T. has worked hard on the lists,

as well as AKC communication.

Post card – Still planning on sending out a "reminder" postcard via regular mail. Would like the logo included and maybe reminder for upcoming deadlines sent to all BCCA members. Probably mail in mid-July.

The Ranch should all be re-built by the county fair in August. We anticipate a few changes and will need to meet there after it's done.



Dogs Domesticated in Middle East, not Asia

Study based on genetic comparisons between 900 dogs and 200 wolves

LOS ANGELES - From French poodles to German shepherds, domestic dogs likely trace most of their ancestry to the Middle East, as opposed to East Asian origins suggested by previous research, a genetic study reported on Wednesday.

The findings, published in the online edition of the scientific journal Nature, support an archeological record that closely links the domestication of dogs in the Middle East with the rise of human civilization there, scientists said.

"It's significant because this is where civilization developed, and dogs were part of that," said Robert Wayne, professor of evolutionary biology at the University of California, Los Angeles, and a senior author of the study.

The region, often referred to as the Fertile Crescent, includes much of modern-day Iraq, Syria, Lebanon and Jordan — "the same area where domestic cats and many of our livestock originated, and where agriculture first developed," he said.

The study is based on genetic comparisons between more than 900 dogs representing 85 breeds and over 200 wild gray wolves — the closest living wild relative of dogs — from around the globe, including North America, Europe, East Asia and the Middle East. In the most extensive such analysis to date, scientists used molecular genetic techniques to examine more than 48,000 markers from across the entire genome — or DNA sequence — from each of the animals included in the study.

What they discovered was the vast majority of dogs share more unique genetic markers with gray wolves from the Mideast than with other wolf populations. A kinship to European wolves also was found, but to a lesser extent, Wayne said.

One notable exception was the finding of a close genetic link between a small number of East Asian

dog breeds and wolves from China, suggesting some intermingling between the two.

But the new research contradicts an earlier genetic study suggesting a close ancestry of all dogs to wolves from East Asia and China. That analysis was based on comparisons between a single, small DNA sequence taken from mitochondria — tiny structures outside the nucleus of living cells that carry their own genes — rather markers from entire genomes.

The newer research was far more comprehensive and "is much more consistent with the archeological record," Wayne said.

"We know that dogs from the Middle East were closely associated with humans because they were found in human burial sites" there, he said. In one famous example, the remains of a puppy were found curled up in the arms of a human skeleton.

But the earliest bond between people and "man's best friend" was probably more often a love-hate relationship that persists in parts of the world to this day, and helps explain a cultural ambivalence toward dogs in the very region where they likely originated.

The archeological record of dogs dates back 31,000 years to the remains of a Great Dane-like specimen found in Belgium. The first Mideast dogs appeared 12,000 to 13,000 years ago.

Although agriculture and animal husbandry go hand in hand, the first people to domesticate dogs from wild wolves probably were nomadic hunter-gatherers, who were followed at a distance by canine interlopers in search of scraps.

That relationship likely matured over thousands of years "to the point where these proto-dogs were living in close proximity with humans," and were often more of a nuisance than they were companions, Wayne said. "Eventually dogs provided protection, an early warning system, maybe even helped out with the hunt, and then eventually, even closer in, provided companionship," he said.

While some dog breeds have ancient histories, 80 percent are modern varieties that have evolved since the explosion in dog breeding during the Victorian era, Wayne said.
