After watching the Veterans Class showing at the recent National Specialty and seeing all those great poised Beardies parading around the ring I was thinking just what was a veteran Beardie equal to in human years. And having a 12 yr old Beardie in our household I am even more aware of the time clock and the speed at which it seems to capture the foolishness, grace and wisdom of our companions.
A quick Google search tells me that a dog's lifespan flexes with the dog's age. A 6 month old Beardie is equal to a 5 year old toddler and at 1 year more equal to a 15 year old teen. How many "teenage" Beardies do we know at their first year birthday? As dogs age the equation seems to shift so that at 5 years they are more like a 37 year old human. More mature, family in progress, championships and other foolishness out of the way and ready to meet with life and its challenges. At 10 years a Beardie is more like a 62 year old human. Their human equivalent of nearing retirement, more settled in their ways, eager for new things but well aware of the consequence that those adventures can bring. At 12 years my Beardie has lived a span equal to 72 human years. She's a little slower, still eager for affection and a good walk but cautious about new things that pop up in her environment.
The chart doesn't go beyond 14 years and fortunately our Beardies often outlive that life span. I have to wonder if this chart is equally applied to a small dog or large dog. My friend with Irish Wolfhounds laments their short lifespan and marvels at my expectations that Beardies easily run to 14
or 16 years still active to the end.
Anyone who shares their life with a dog knows what other dog owners know. We understand how a dog's life cycle repeats itself from puppy to adult to elder. As the elder years approach we quickly seek a puppy before our senior family member gets too infirm. We know
that the vigor and excitement a puppy brings, and the promise of a future of new adventure, is important to our lives. Maybe as important as food or companionship. The energy and personality they bring to your home cannot be compared to anything else, in my mind.
There are a lot of reasons, all objective, about why dogs are important to their humans. From therapy empath's to seeing eye companions. But there are other subjective benefits. An older NIH study (1987) notes that "proven pet programs (are) superior in producing psychological benefits compared to some other alternative therapies such as arts and crafts programs, friendly visitor programs and conventional psychotherapy." When we visit my mother in her apartment at the senior center she is almost more excited about the arrival of our dogs than seeing us. Here's a Brooklyn born war bride who wouldn't let us kids have a cat or dog inside the farm house, rarely visited the barn and would have nothing of baby kittens or puppies anywhere near the front door. But now she has spent time with our dogs, learned to accept their patient nosing's, and has welcomed them into her apartment. When we are there l've seen her stroking their heads and backs sharing their energy. She is even anxious to share them with her neighbors who also dote
over the lovely loving Beardies who change the routine of their complex.
A senior dog in a household can be difficult. We've been through that routine more times than I wish to know. Tears come to my eyes even as I think of those now past. But that memory also includes the seemingly fearless manner with which our elder Beardies have faced their last years. Always ready for a walk even if we had to
carry them home. Always pushing a ball at our feet even if they couldn't see where you would toss it. And always warm at your feet to the end.
So, do I lament the ages of our Beardies who now register 62 and 72 in human years? In truth I watch them to learn how I should live out my senior years.

3. All persons applying must be members of the RMBCC in good standing, as well as with the AKC, at
the time in which the title is awarded, achieved and presented.
4. If you are a regular member and this is your first award, please indicate on the form below that a
plaque will be needed to hold the award plate(s). A separate application is required for each dog if more than one dog in your household has received titles during 2010.
