On August 27, 2011 we received word that our dearly beloved friend, mentor, breeder and judge had passed away. Jo is survived by Nancy Mallon and Carole Borra, 5 grand children and several great grand children.

Jo was a member for the Queen City Bearded Collie Club until it dissolved and then became the Rocky Mountain Bearded Collie Connection. She enjoyed the clubs and was willing to pass on the information on the breed at any time. The dogs were the joy of her life.

Jo was very involved in the dog show world. While living in Texas she belonged to several kennel clubs and started out breeding and raising Cocker Spaniels. Then Jo went on to a long and successful time breeding, showing and judging Shetland Sheepdogs. Jo became interested in and bought her first Bearded Collie in the early 70's before they had AKC recognition and again had great success breeding, showing, and judging her new breed. She was considered one of the pioneers of the breed. Jo enjoyed traveling to many parts of the country to show her dogs and meet with many friends at the shows.

Jo was an American Kennel Club judge for several breeds, judging shows all around the United States. She strongly believed that dogs should be bred to the breed standard they were developed to be and to be able to do the jobs they were bred for. She was very involved with the Bearded Collie Club of America and was president of that organization at one time. On the local level she was a life member of the Flatirons Kennel Club Inc. and enjoyed working at their shows in many ways through the years. She also wrote many columns for different breed magazines.

Jo will be missed by many who learned from her vast knowledge.

My little friend, Cleo is so much fun, but she gets really anxious when our people leave for work. She has torn up their stuff a few times even though I barked her not to. I want to help but I tried bringing her my toys and sometimes she just tears them up rather than playing toys with me.

Dear Friend,

There are several things that may help. First, communicate to your people that they should take both of you for a short walk before they leave in the morning. Then, let them know that they should get one of those toys to put bits of food in for Cleo to work at while they are away. She will probably work at getting the kibble out of the toy for a couple of hours and not be anxious. If your people are acting all sad and guilty for leaving the two of you at home, let them know they should not get all emotional. Cleo is picking up on that and getting anxious. Also let them know that they should be non-emotional when they come home. They can give each of you a dog treat when they leave, and when leave quietly so that leaving is pleasant experience rather than a big guilt scene. I know how challenging this is for you and your people. The other thing that makes anxious dogs feel secure is to have your people set up a smaller space or room for the two of you with a blanket, water, and perhaps a kennel with the door open; rather than having the run of a big empty house.

#### Knowing Noses

Watching my girls on the floor in front of me last evening I was thinking about just what it is that makes our Beardies so endearing. Is it their cute black nose? There's so much character in that black nubbin. Our now passed Dylan had a blue nose and even that was the delightful part of his character. Notice how the nose "rubber" changes color back into the white hair. The whole wonder of the wet point of contact on a dog is worth at least an hour of on-the-floor examination. It reflects light and although black as tar it has a luster that reflects light and is a mirror to your companion's soul.

I know that a cool moist nose is the sign of a healthy dog. And I know that sun burn on the bridge of their snout and nose "rubber" occurs with prolonged exposure to the sun. A runny nose, one that changes colors, or one that bleeds, or when a dog just isn't poking her nose into your business, are all signs that something is changed. It may indicate anything from seasonal allergies, vitamin deficiency, bad food, foreign bodies, tumors, and any sort of malady. Yes, it's as important of a health gauge as feeling the forehead of your child to see if he has a fever.

The one part of a dog's nose that intrigues me most is that black part and how it morphs into the white skin on the top of the snout and how it continues down to their upper lip, covered with a nice white mustache. The delicate hairs on the upper lip are sensitive and I love just brushing them to get a reaction from my little girl. It's something so private and personal that she is surprised by my gesture and maybe a bit by my understanding of something that is so personal for her.

I know she thinks I'm a silly human for my attention to something she must not even think of. It's like her lightly brushing the hair on the back of my hand to see if I will give a reaction. Well, wait, she does that with my pant leg many times a day. I think she's playing with me!.

Animals without fingers need their noses, snout and lips to manipulate their world. Picking up food at the point where they can't see it requires a strong sense of smell, sensitive lips and whiskers to give form and position to what is going into their mouth. And the nose of your dog is one marvelous creation for that purpose. Smell and touch organized to put the teeth around something desirable.

At dinner the familiar nose is poking up under my elbow hoping for some attention and probably a piece of the meal I'm eating. Sometimes I think maybe she's nudging my elbow to cause me to spill something so that she can just snarf it up. A nose can find anything especially something that is worth eating, or anything that smells good.

In the morning when I let the dogs out they will almost always follow the back yard fence, sniffing for who visited our yard the night before. If a fox 
(frequent in our neighborhood) spent the night in our 
yard (and flattened my groundcovers) they know it, 
follow it's track and roll in the scent of the wild animal. (Disgusting!)

Dog noses are used to sniff out disaster victims, bomb, IED's, infections, and even lost sheep. The sensitivity of a dog's nose is legend and often, I believe, under rated as a feature and driving force of our beloved animal.

A fun experience for you to try. Close your fist and place it over your nose so that you have a "nose" like your dog. Doesn't the world look different? Your "nose" points to what you are interested in. It creates a focus, something to look down and something to look past.

I am waiting for the time when I am down on the floor looking at my dog's nose and she leans over and inspects my mustache. Maybe even just to sniff the remains of the evening's dinner. Now that would be something to consider. They are watching us as much as we are watching them. <>

# Herding Instinct Test October 15, 2011 SAVE THIS FIRST PAGE FOR DIRECTIONS, SEND IN THE 2<sup>ND</sup> PAGE AND READ ON FOR OTHER REQUIRED INFORMATION

This is a test to find out if your dog or bitch has the instinct to herd sheep. The dog has to be 6 months or older. This is not an AKC title only a RMBCC and BCCA title. No other tests or trials will be held on this date. Little or no training needs to have been done to participate. Each dog will have approximately 10 minutes, and the judging will start at **9:00 am** and go until we are done. I will place you as close to your desired time as requested. I will send you a confirmation of receiving the form, money, and your scheduled time through your email.

Cost: \$35.00 per dog <u>Deadline: Oct. 7, 2011</u>

Send the enclosed form (disclaimer and information form--2nd sheet only) along with a check made out to RMBCC with an AKC registration copy. (Non-Beardies or non-registered Beardies do not have to send an AKC registration). If you have a ILP number or PAL #, either is fine. Re- testing any dog is encouraged too.

Bring your camera, water for you and your dog, perhaps a snack, coat (check weather), and a chair. A port-opotty is on the *premise*.

#### **Directions to Cathy's place:**

**From the north---**take I-25 south to Hwy 52 exit (Dacona; Ft. Lupton--#235) Turn east on HWY 52 and go 9 miles to Ft. Lupton. At the 2nd light, (Denver Ave) turn right (south) and go for about 1 1/2 miles. This is Ct. Rd 27. There is a vegetable farm on the SE (Vallano Brothers). Turn left (east) on Ct. Rd 10. Go 1 1/2 miles look for Valdemar Farms mail box-- North side of road -- also a big red barn. Address is 14741 Weld County Rd 10. You will pull on the east side of the house and go through the gate and park against the south fence unless the field is extremely wet.

From the south-- You could take the same instructions as above turning off I-25 at the same exit (235) and going east on HWY 52, **OR** you could take another. Take I-25 to I-76 east bound to HWY 85 North (sign says Greeley/ Brighton). Go past all the exits for Brighton and look for Ct. Rd. 8. Turn east on it and go 1/2 mile to stop sign. Turn left (north) on Ct Rd. 27 and go 1 mile north to Ct. Rd 10 where the Vallano Vegetable Farm sign is. Turn east on Ct. Rd 10 and go 1 1/2 miles to Valdemar Farm-north side of road. You will pull on the east side of the house and go through the gate and park against the south fence unless the field is extremely wet. Keep this sheet for your information. DO NOT TAKE THAT CURVE. Go straight onto the dirt road, which is Supai Road. There is a street sign on your left. Within 20 feet take a left into the first driveway – address is marked on a big piece of flagstone – La Boheme, 23782 Supai Road. Go up the driveway and park in the grass next to the

agility field.
