We acquired a 4 year old Beardie boy, Cormac almost a year ago. He came to us very well behaved and is quite the charmer as most Beardie's are, but we still thought we should take a basic obedience class with him. At the same time we also moved away from the Front Range and access to many dog trainers that we were familiar with. After a brief search of trainers in the Buena Vista and Salida area we discovered the Ouray Working Dog Club (OWDC) in Salida. www.ouraywdc.org and on Facebook. OWDC is an all-breed, multi disciplinary dog training club. Members train in the sports of IPO (schutzhund) mondioring and AKC/UKC and areas of competition including obedience, rally and agility. Although the majority of the clinics focus on the sport of schutzhund, the owner, Marsha Boggs also offers group and private obedience classes.

We started classes last June and at the end of each session Marsha tested our pups per AKC requirements. Once we completed a session we moved on to bigger and more difficult skills. It has been 7 months and we are hooked. Not only have the classes been fun and rewarding but the knowledge we have gained from Marsha on how to "bond" with our dog and be better dog owners is invaluable. We are more confident and also have a more confident dog. Honestly, we thought the class would simply just teach him

new skills. Never did we realize how much the training would change us and improve our dog's behavior. Again, this is a dog that came to us with some really good behaviors. His attentiveness, willingness to try new things and his ability to want to please has really come through due to the training.

We still go weekly as weather allows. The training area is outdoors with plenty of space to be Covid safe throughout the class. Our group has now progressed to training outside the facility. Our dogs are learning body balance by jumping on rocks and over obstacles. We have been teaching them how to sit under benches and to calmly address other dogs as they walk by. There have been so many skills that Marsha has taught us. She has given us tips on how to be trail safe. She often sends us videos and other resources to support our training. Each week we check in and she addresses specific areas that we ask.

Marsha and OWDC have made our transition- new dog, new house and new community- a wonderful experience. Her love and devotion for all dogs (and owners) is obvious. We can't wait to see what the future holds for us.

Herding Instinct Test - Oct 17, 2020

Our club, the Rocky Mountain Bearded Collie Connection, hosted BCCA Herding Instinct Test on October 17, 2020. Boy, did we luck out with a beautiful Colorado day! The location was Hachita Farms in Elizabeth, CO. Our judge and owner of this beautiful ranch is Carrie Sparks, an experienced judge for both AKC and AHBC.

The Herding Instinct Test is a pass/fail test that accesses that potential herding capability of the dog. The Beardie need not be trained. In order to pass, the Beardie should show interest with confidence in the stock, but not appear aggressive.

Total entry for the day was twelve Beardies. A great entry for our little local Beardie club! Each dog received about ten minutes in the arena with three sheep. We had nine Beardies that qualified, so a seventy-five percent pass rate. For those passing, a certificate was awarded by the Bearded Collie Club of America.

At the end of the instinct tests, we had our fellow experienced herding RMBCC member, Russ Kittel, do a demo for us with his Beardie, Lexie. This gave those interested in continuing with herding an idea of what can be done, with instruction and dedication.

As luck had it, Don and Elodji lived only a few minutes away from our herding site and they invited us over for lunch after our herding event. Many thanks to the Means' for treating us to a yummy lunch!

For those that did not pass the HIT, it often takes a couple or more times for a dog to "turn on", so be sure to give it another try. The club will certainly look at having another Herding Instinct Test in the future.

BEARDIE MINUTE

Well, time for another minute of my thoughts on Bearded Collies, humans and that interaction we all have come to enjoy.

This past year we have all come to know our Beardie better while working at home or just quarantined from the spread of a pandemic disease. And I have some thoughts to share, probably not original thoughts but worth considering at this time. First let's think about how 2020 looks and affects our dogs and then consider what it means to us.

Dogs are creatures with great empathy (no news to our readers) and their awareness of our concern over the virus spread, masks, vaccine's, along with the political confusion earlier this year have us cuddled with our dogs and remaining home more than normal. That morning trip to the coffee shop means we remain in the car for them to deliver it to us. Weekly trips to the grocery store also means we remain in the car waiting for the store to return with the groceries. All this we are wearing masks, keeping contact to a minimum and washing our hands all the time.

Our dogs get more hug time, more treat delivered games and no dog shows or classes. For them it certainly means less dog-dog socialization and a closer bond with us humans. But I think it also means they get a chance to teach us new activities.

Last summer our Beardie, Abbey, started an evening "game" of roaming the house to see what is out of place and if it is "not supposed to be there" she will pick it up and bring it to one of us. Papers, magazines, trash, water bottles, gloves, anything. Like she's cleaning an already clean house keeping it to her standards. Of course, we trade those items for a little bit of kibble and maybe that's what she has taught us to do. And maybe that's what these past 9-10 months has produced. Humans learning to give treats to dogs in trade for cute doggie "tricks."

I do wish that we could speak the same language. She's barking if someone is at the front door, if the squirrel runs the back yard fence, if she's feeling frisky, if I'm walking down the stairs, or if I pick up my wallet and keys to go for a drive. She's on it, barking to tell me something. I don't understand why she's barking or what she's saying but eventually we move on and she's part of the activity. Another is a low wine at the door which I know means "time to go out." At night a fluff, scratch and staring directly into my face means "time to go out" and I dutifully bundle up to take her out.

I have a feeling that if this quarantine lasts much longer, I will have figured what her 12 bark "paragraph" is telling me and maybe we can cut it down to 6 barks. For now, I'm happy she shares. (I've been thinking maybe it's a form of herding... she's driving me to get my shoes on, grab the keys and go for a Pup-a-chino from Starbucks.

What have I learned from this closer time with Abbey? It's that she needs human closeness as well and seems to grow closer because of it. Whether it's cuddled up in the bed at night or snuggled on the couch to watch the evening news. Our girl has us convinced that not only do our activities happen with her but always happen because of her. I kinda like this arrangement.

Oh, before I forget, my phone has an app that watches the front steps and when someone comes to the door or just passes by on the walk my phone will vibrate a bit. Well, Abbey now knows that when the phone vibrates to that special sequence, she is bark-bark at the door even before the doorbell rings. Maybe I should get her a phone of her own?
