Aunt Beardie's people accepted the challenge and began working on it. Aunt Beardie's wise advice to her people was to create short videos by topic so specific grooming tips can be located quickly.

Beardie Grooming Tips Video NOW POSTED ON THE RMBCC WEBSITE!

Have you ever been at the pet food store, training class, dog show, hotel or wherever you travel with your Beardie(s)? The questions, especially if your Beardie is in full coat, usually go something like: "Do you have to brush him a lot? Do they shed? How often do you have to brush her? Do you groom him yourself? Do they get matted? How do they see through all that hair?" These often follow; "What kind of dog is that?"

One day while several "human Beardie moms" were discussing the techniques each of us learned over 30 plus years of grooming our Beardies, we hoped that just maybe we could help other Beardie owners by sharing some grooming tips. As we shared our grooming nuggets that we had learned along the way, we quickly realized that we needed expert grooming advice if we were to actually be helpful to the new as well as the experienced Beardie owner. Ta-Da! Jennie Smith, Certified Master Groomer, Certified Grooming Instructor was the immediate and unanimous choice given her expertise and experience grooming Beardies.

We began to brainstorm the kinds of tips we needed to share. As a new owner starting out with a Beardie puppy grooming seems to be a no-brainer. Brushing that adorable puppy coat is a breeze compared to the adolescent coat when the undercoat balloons, the coat grows longer, and suddenly grooming is a full-time job with a million coat maintenance questions. Yes, we needed an expert to provide grooming techniques to solve the grooming needs of the growing puppy and the adult dog. A timely survey completed by RMBCC members added more grooming challenges to address in the videos.

Our list of grooming tips grew by the minute. How about: clearing mats, avoiding mats, ears, private parts, and those hairy, dinner plate-sized feet? We need to add caring for teeth, nails and so many more grooming tips. Oh, and remember to cover the perfect grooming tools and products. And what about the clipped Beardie coat that still needs grooming? The list grew but it was always intended to address the *basic life-long task of grooming of the Bearded Collie*; NOT how to groom the dog for the conformation dog show ring.

Jennie Smith, CMG, CGI, was the perfect answer to our list of grooming tips. The short, topic specific grooming videos produced explicitly for the RMBCC are the result of Jennie Smith's education, experience, grooming shop and school, her Beardie clients, and the grooming questions and challenges we all deal with to maintain our Beardie coats. The RMBCC hopes that members find the videos helpful and enjoyable. Videos were filmed in small segments to address and easily locate specific grooming issues that can be found in the RMBCC website.
