2023 Andrew Award Luke and Norm Lazarus

True to his breed, **Luke** had the sweetest disposition and was best known for his therapy work. He spent half day every Tuesday for 10 years working at Swedish Medical Center. We received the Bearded Collie Club of America's Andrew Award for therapy in 2017, 2021 and I was honored to be recognized for 2022 for my therapy work with Luke. Luke kept working as a therapy dog after being diagnosed with liver cancer in April of 2019.

During the initial wave of Covid when the hospital was offering vaccines, the Hospital contacted us right away with the medical staff via a late-night e-mail to come in right away in order to continue the visits.



Upon our return post-Covid, I discovered my favorite nurse had moved to another office. The message went out from the nurse's station that there was a hairy guy named Luke here to visit and less than a minute later, Luke and the nurse were reunited and hugging.

As Luke was nearing 14 ½ years, it was becoming difficult for him to catch a proper grip on the smooth floors and our visits were getting much shorter in length. As he struggled to get going, I was getting flustered and about to lift him up and carry him to the nearest elevator to exit. Little did I know I was being watched from down the end of this long hallway by two nurses and an aide who were escorting a patient from surgery to their room. I could hear someone say, "this doesn't look right" and saw out of the corner of my eye that these two nurses were running frantically at us. One of them ran to the nearby supply closet to gather two sets of socks for his feet. His feet were much too hairy, and the socks kept falling down. The other nurse ran back to the supply room, grabbed a roll of scotch tape and we were shortly on our way to complete the visit, getting lots of quizzical looks for the peculiar fashion statement we had made. Our visits ended shortly thereafter in July of 2022.

Given the nature of the job, we were on the receiving end of many kind remarks and actions. It was nice that Luke got offered snacks but the real treat for me was the comments people make to show their appreciation for just being someone's companion for a short while. It built as time went on. One nurse told me she had a picture of Luke in her locker as her source of inspiration as she starts her work day. Another said she got a dog because of Luke. The young girl behind the snack counter runs out to offer Luke a piece of cheese. The CEO takes a moment as he's walking by to greet us as he's having a phone conversation. I had two volunteer octogenarian lady friends I regularly checked in with — Cretia and Eve. Eve always had a treat for Luke. When her dog died, she gave me her expensive leftover medicine that we had been also using for Luke. She started crying when she saw Luke and died two weeks later. Cretia had no computer, so I made a copies of her special recognition award and photo so she could send them to her family members. She passed away as well.

I suggested to many of those who were the most overjoyed to get a visit from Luke to take photos of him to be kept and revisited on a blue day. That way the memory never has to end, as it will never end for me.
