It sounds like you are describing "the zoomies." I get asked this question often. Pups may suddenly have a need to disperse energy, and they run or zoom around as fast as they can go for a short time. My experts say that the zoomies are a quick way for dogs to release pent-up energy, excitement, or nervous energy.

Sometimes adult dogs get "the zoomies" but usually it is the pups. Although the exact cause is not fully understood, experts believe lack of exercise may trigger zoomies, such as when the humans come home from work and pup has been quiet during the day. Stress, nervousness or being overtired may also trigger zoomies.

My little darlings often get the zoomies after their bath. It may feel good to run to shake of dripping bath water or it may just feel good to release the tension of being such a good dog during the bath. The pups seem to enjoy it. Do not worry; Racer is not crazy.
